"THE CHESTNUT TREE" This initial issue of "The Chestnut Tree," the official organ of the Chastain Family Association brings to mind the reason for naming our publication as such.

The following is extracted from Cameron Allen's article "The Chastain Families of Manikin Town in Virginia and Their Origin Abroad," as published in "The American Genealogist." (v. 39, No. 3 July 1963, p. 150)

"Chastain is a not uncommon family name in France, with numerous variants in spelling. The standard form is Chataignier which means chestnut (tree). Variants are (in the north) Chatainier, Chatain, Chatin, Chataignon, Chataignoux, Chataigneau, Chatain. There are

numerous regional variations; in the Massif Central: Chastaignier, Chastaing, Chastan, Chastain, Chastang, Chastand, Chastenent, Chastanet; in the Midi: Castain, Castang, Casaing, Castagnier, Castagnie. The name derives either from the tree, or from the color of the chestnut itself, in an attempt to describe the hair color of the first bearers of the surname, to differentiate these individuals from persons of the same neighborhood of identical font names. (Albert Dauzat, Dictionaire Etymologique des Noms de Famille et Prenoms de France. 2d edition revisee, Paris, 1949, pp. 148, 185; Dauzat, Les Noms de Personnes: Origine et Evolution, Paris, 1946, p. 95). While the noun chataignier is the word in common use in standard French for chestnut tree, the word chatain is the standard French form, either as adjective or noun, to mean chestnut color, nut-brown, or auburn (Gasc's Dictionary of the French and English Languages, London, 1941). Rietstap's Armorial General gives illustrations of a number of coats-of-arms borne by families of these several variants in widely scattered parts of France, the device most typically found thereon being not unnaturally a chestnut tree."

From the above it can be seen that the name "Chastain" literally means "Chestnut" or "Chestnut tree." Therefore we feel it is appropriate to name our publication, "The Chestnut Tree," for, in a very real sense, it is our "Family Tree."

We plan on publishing "The Chestnut Tree," quarterly - in January, April, July and October.

OUR THAIKS go to Jon Williams for the design and art work of the heading of our publication. Jon is not a Chastain descendant, but perhaps we should make him an "honorary" Chastain.

The Pierre Chastain Family Association welcomes all Chastain descendants and invite them to join our organization and receive our quarterly publication, "The Chestnut Tree." OUR EMIGRANT ANCESTORS

The best documented, and by far the most complete account of the early history of our Chastain forebears that your genealogist has been able to find comes from Cameron Allen in his series "The Chastain Families of Manakin Town in Virginia," published in "The American Genealogist," July 1963, January and July 1964, from which your genealogist gives credit for much of the following.

Cameron Allen states there were four men of somewhat similar name, who came over on "The Mary and Ann," the first of the four ships which brought most of the French Huguenots to Manakin Town in Virginia in 1700. They were: "Pierre Chastain sa femme et cinq enfants. Estienne Chastain (apparently a single man at that time). Quintin Chastatain)apparently a single man). Pierre Chatanier, sa femme et son pere."

In speaking of Quintin Chastatain, he states that no further records appear; and surmises that Pierre Chatanier is the one who is probably called <u>Chalanier</u> on the Miller's List of February 1700/1. (VHS, <u>Collections</u>, 5;27) and <u>Chalagenie</u> on William Byrd's list of November 1701 (ibid, 5:46). He further states that it appears he did not remain in Manikin Town very long, that he possibly migrated to the Trent River settlement of the Huguenots in Craven Precinct, North Carolina and appears to have died without leaving any male issue.

That leaves Pierre and Estienne or Stephen. He brings out that it is very unlikely that Pierre and Estienne were related inasmuch as they came from widely separated parts of France; Pierre from Charost in the ancient Province of Berri and Estiennge from Vesc in the Province of Dauphine, about 150 miles to the southeast.

Estienne appears to have been single upon his arrival in America. He married (1) Martha ______ ca. 1701, who died December 24, 1725, aged 52 or 53 years. No issue: He married (2) ca. 1726, Marthe Dupuy, daughter of Bartholomew Dupuy. Issue:

- 1. Marie Magdelaine Chastain, b. 23 August 1727.
- Chastain (a boy), b. 3 Nov. 1728; died before January 1732/3.
- 3. Estienne Chastain, b. 1 March 1729/30; died before January 1732/3.

Marie Magdelaine Chastain, b. 23 Aug..1727 married (1) James Cocke, son of Powell Cocke and Martha Herbert. She married (2) Peter Farrarr. She had issue by both marriages.

From the foregoing account, it can readily be seen that Estienne or Stephen Chastain left no male issue. This brings us to Pierre Chastain, our common ancestor, and the one for whom our association is named. Pierre Chastain, sa femme et cinq enfants embarked on the ship "Mary and Ann." on 19 April 1700, and arrived at the mouth of the James River on 23 July 1700. (VHS Collections, n.s. v. 6: pp. 65-67).

His first wife, whose name is unknown to us, but who is said to have been Marie Magdalene de la Rochefaucald, and who accompanied him across the Atlantic, apparently died during the first winter after arrival. It also appears that several of Pierre Chastain's children died shortly after their arrival in Manikin Town.

Pierre Chastain married (2) Anne Soblet, b. ca. 1684, daughter of Abraham Soblet and Susanne Brian. The register of King William Parish verifies this, for, "on 3 April 1723, died Anne Soblet the sieur Pierre Chastain, aged about years; was buried the 4th of the month." (Register of King William Parish, VHS Collections n.s. 5: 110). Cameron Allen says, of the above, "to achieve the identity suggested above it is necessary to supply in the blanks "the wife of." Unaided by other references it would be just as possible to supply alternatively, "the daughter of" and thus make her wife of one of the young Soblets. However the death register also gives this reference: "the 12th of January 1722 (1723), died Janne Chastain, daughter of ieur Chastain and Anne Chastain, her father and mother, aged about 6 years, was buried the 13th of the month, on Sunday, at three o'clock in the afternoon." This presumably refers to the same Anne and makes her wife to Pierre Chastain, hence born a Soblet."
